ORDER GRANTING APPLICATION

The above-captioned matter comes before the State Corporation Commission of the State of Kansas (“Commission”) for consideration and determination. Having examined its files and records, the Commission finds and concludes:

I. BACKGROUND

1. On February 20, 2025, Evergy Kansas Central, Inc. (“EKC”) filed an application in the above-captioned docket requesting to cease operating as an electric public utility with regard to a tract of land in Osage County, Kansas.¹

2. The legal description of the tract of land is as follows:

OSAGE COUNTY, KANSAS

The West 1/2 of Southeast 1/4 and East 1/2 of Southwest 1/4 of Section 14,
Township 15 South, Range 16 East

3. The above-described tract of land is located on the service border of EKC and FreeState Electric Cooperative (“FreeState”). On March 24, 2025, FreeState filed an application

in Docket No. 25-FSEE-362-COC requesting to expand its certificated territory into the above-described tract of land.²

4. On May 8, 2025, Commission Staff (“Staff”) submitted a Report and Recommendation (“R&R”) in which Staff analyzed both EKC and FreeState’s applications.³ Staff ultimately recommended that the Commission find that public convenience and necessity will be promoted by this transaction and therefore grant EKC’s Application.⁴ Staff’s R&R is incorporated by reference herein and attached hereto as **Attachment A**.

5. An EKC customer wishes to build a home on their property that is located on the border of the certified territory of EKC and FreeState in the above-described tract of land.⁵ To remain an EKC customer, EKC would be required to build 1.45 miles of distribution line to reach this location at a cost to this customer of over \$100,000.⁶ FreeState represented that it currently has a distribution line located approximately 3,800 feet from the proposed location of the new home and therefore estimated that the cost to the customer to receive service will be roughly \$37,000.⁷ EKC and FreeState have mutually agreed, subject to Commission approval, that FreeState should serve as the electric provider for this customer.⁸

II. LEGAL STANDARDS AND DISCUSSION

6. The Retail Electric Suppliers Act (“RESA”), K.S.A. 66-1,170 *et. seq.*, requires the State of Kansas to be divided into electric service territories in which only one retail electric

supplier is established for a given territory.⁹ RESA provides that retail electric suppliers may enter into agreements to amend boundaries between their facilities, subject to Commission approval.¹⁰

7. The Commission is given full power, authority, and jurisdiction to supervise and control the electric public utilities, as defined in K.S.A. 66-101a, doing business in Kansas, and is empowered to do all things necessary and convenient for the exercise of such power, authority, and jurisdiction.¹¹ The Commission has the power to grant an application to Cease Service if doing so would promote public convenience and necessity.

III. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

8. The Commission finds that it would be substantially less expensive and more convenient for this customer for FreeState to provide electric service to this customer whose property is located in the above-described tract of land.

9. The Commission finds that EKC and FreeState have mutually agreed, subject to Commission approval, that FreeState should serve as the electric provider for this customer.

10. The Commission finds that the recommendations contained in Staff's May 8, 2025, R&R are reasonable and adopts the same.

11. The Commission concludes that public convenience and necessity will be promoted by the approval of EKC's Application.

B. Any party may file and serve a petition for reconsideration pursuant to the requirements and time limits established by K.S.A. 77-529(a)(1).¹²

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

In Docket 25-EKCE-326-CCS, Evergy Kansas Central, Inc. (Evergy) is seeking approval of the Commission to Cease transacting as an electric public utility for a small tract (tract) of land in Osage County. In Docket 25-FSEE-362-COC, FreeState Electric Cooperative, Inc. (FreeState) is requesting a Certificate of Convenience and Authority to engage in the business of an electric public utility for the tract of land.

Staff recommends that the Commission grant these Applications and find that public convenience will be promoted by this transaction.

BACKGROUND:

On February 20, 2025, Evergy brought Docket 25-EKCE-326-CCS by filing an application to Cease transacting as an electric public utility in a small tract of land in Osage County. On March 24, 2025, FreeState brought Docket 25-FSEE-362-COC by filing an Application for the Certificate of Convenience and Authority to engage in the business of an electric public utility for the Tract.

A customer wishing to build a home on their property is on the border of the certified territory of Evergy and FreeState. The building location is currently in the certified territory of Evergy. To remain an Evergy customer, they would be required to build 1.45 miles of distribution line to reach this location at a cost of over \$100,000.¹ FreeState has a distribution line roughly 3,800 feet from the location. Through an email from Staff to FreeState, FreeState estimated that the cost to the customer will be roughly \$37,000. It is substantially less expensive for FreeState to provide electric needs for this customer. Both Evergy and FreeState have mutually agreed, subject to Commission approval, that FreeState should serve as the electric provider for this customer.

The landowner's property is located along the line dividing Evergy and FreeState territories. It would be inconvenient and more expensive for the landowner to accept if Evergy was to extend a distribution line to their property. FreeState has facilities contiguous to the landowner's property and can provide electricity without the added cost to remain an Evergy customer.

ANALYSIS:

The Commission has jurisdiction to grant a Certificate of Convenience to any public utility seeking to transact business in the State of Kansas.² K.S.A. 66-1,170 et seq., the Retail Electric Suppliers Act (RESA) requires the State of Kansas to be divided into electric service territories in which only one retail electric supplier is established for a given territory.³ Notwithstanding the mandated single electric provider service territories, RESA also provides that retail electric suppliers can enter into agreements to amend boundaries between their facilities.⁴ Such agreements are filed in the form of Certificates and, if approved by the Commission, Certificates to amend the subject territory are issued accordingly.⁵

The statutory standard in this matter is whether the public convenience will be promoted by the transaction of the applicant's business and permitting the Applicant to transact the business of a...public utility.⁶

Staff has reviewed both Applications and has confirmed the legal descriptions included in both Applications are accurately depicted on the map attached to each Application. Staff has also confirmed that the legal descriptions are not in conflict with the Commission's Certificate records. The legal description, Attachment A, and map depicting the territory trade, Attachment B, are included in this Report and Recommendation.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Commission grant these Applications and find that public convenience will be promoted by this transaction. Upon approval, the updated territory descriptions will be reflected in the Commission's certified territory map.

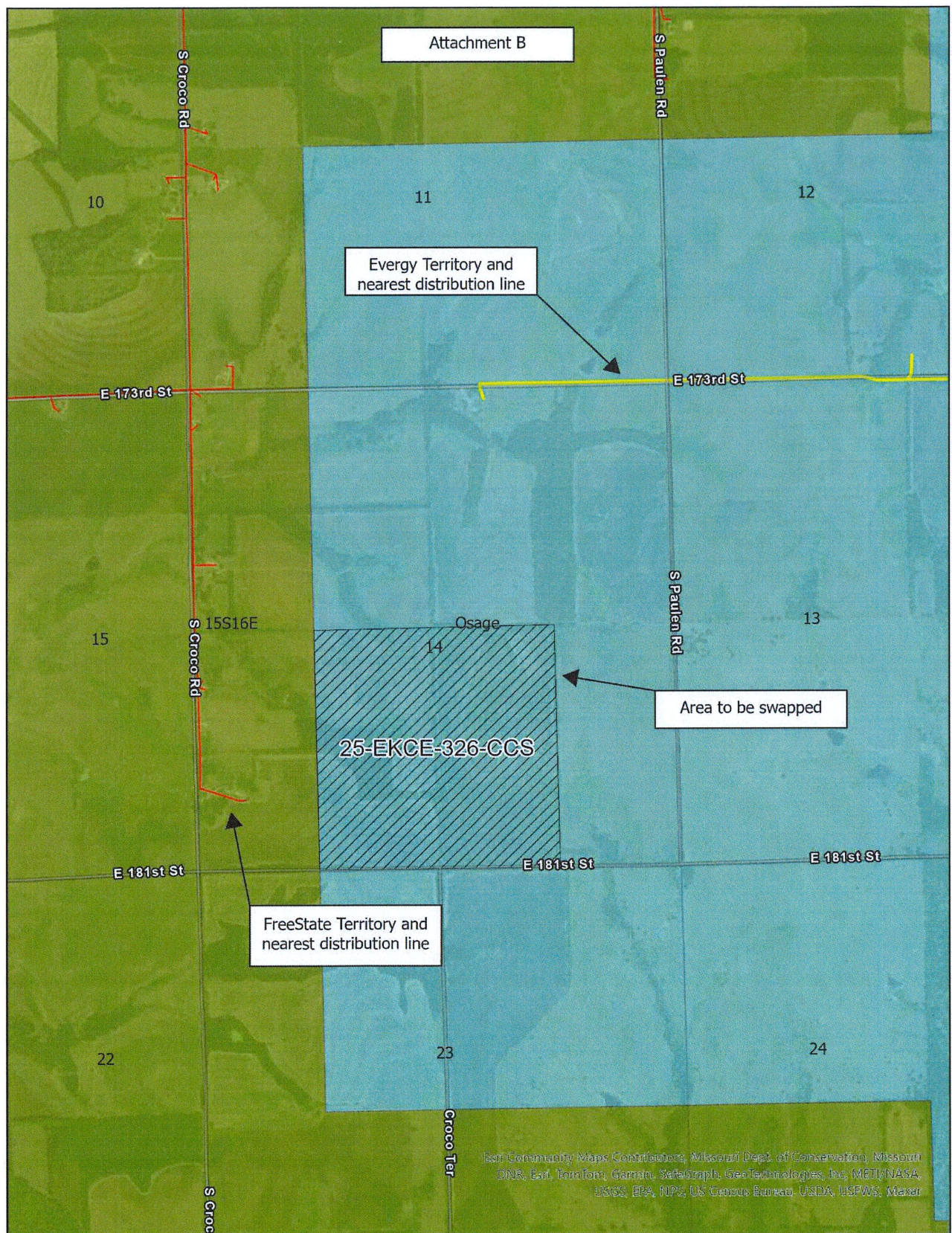
