ORDER OPENING DOCKET AND ESTABLISHING PROCEDURAL SCHEDULE

NOW, the above-captioned matter comes before the State Corporation Commission of the State of Kansas ("Commission") for consideration and decision. Having reviewed its files and records and being duly advised in the premises, the Commission makes the following findings:

I. KUSF Support and Affordable Rates

1. K.S.A. 66-2008(a) states: "The commission shall require every telecommunications carrier, telecommunications public utility and wireless telecommunications service provider that provides intrastate telecommunications services and, to the extent not prohibited by federal law, every provider of interconnected VoIP service, as defined by 47 C.F.R. 9.3 (October 1, 2005), to contribute to the [Kansas Universal Service Fund ("KUSF")] on an equitable and nondiscriminatory basis." In Docket No. 94-GIMT-478-GIT¹, the Commission declared that the KUSF contribution would be assessed yearly on each provider's intrastate retail revenues.

- In order to determine sufficient KUSF support, K.S.A. 66-2005(e) requires the 2. Commission to determine the affordable residential and single-line business rates for rate-ofreturn regulated LECs, effective March 2007 and every two years thereafter. The affordable residential rate is the weighted arithmetic mean of the residential local service rates, as of October 1, for rural LECs ("RLECs") and rate groups 1 through 3 for all other LECs, weighted by the number of residential access lines to which each rate applies, rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar.² The affordable single-line business rate is the existing rate or an amount \$3.00 higher than the affordable residential rate, whichever is greater.³
- 3. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(7) allows an RLEC to adopt a uniform rate for residential and single-line business local service, which rate shall be deemed an affordable rate under subsection (e) if the uniform rate generates an equal amount of revenue as that which would be generated by the separate residential and single-line affordable business rates.
- 4. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)'s provisions do not apply to RLECs that do not receive KUSF support; however, such RLECs' residential rates are included in the affordable rate calculation.
- 5. Commission Staff ("Staff") submitted a Report and Recommendation ("R&R") on August 15, 2014, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. In order to determine the KUSF Year 19 assessment rate and affordable rates, Staff recommended that CenturyLink and the RLECs file their September 30, 2014, access line data and their October 1, 2014, residential and single-line business rates, by rate group, and resulting local revenue increases, no later than October 17, 2014. Staff further noted that Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("SWBT") need only file its September 30, 2014, access line data, as it is no longer receiving

KUSF support. Staff further recommended that companies provide documentation to support their reported data.

6. Staff recommended Companies use Attachments A, B and C to this Order to file their data with the Commission:

II. Procedural Schedule

7. Staff proposes a procedural schedule to govern this docket as follows:

- 8. In order for the Commission to address the next year's KUSF assessment rate and affordable rates at the same time, Staff calculated the preliminary affordable rates to be utilized by the RLECs and CenturyLink when completing Attachment B. The residential and single-line business preliminary affordable rates are \$17.00 and \$20.00, respectively. Staff recommended that RLECs not receiving KUSF support still complete Attachment B, but without reflecting any local rate increases.
- 9. Staff also suggested that if a party becomes aware of any computational error in Staff's calculations, the party should notify Staff as soon as possible, so as to allow Staff to determine whether the error is material and file revised calculations, if necessary.

III. Commission's Adoption of Staff's Recommendations

10. The Commission finds Staff's recommendations to be reasonable and hereby adopts the same. Companies shall file their information in the docket utilizing the forms provided by Staff referenced above, and shall adhere to the procedural schedule adopted herein. Failure to submit data in a timely manner may subject a Company to penalties. Companies shall submit electronic versions of the filed information, in Microsoft Excel format, to Staff at s.reams@kcc.ks.gov. The Companies shall also file documentation supporting their reported line counts in the Docket and provide a copy to Staff.

IV. Procedural Matters Regarding Electronic Service and Entries of Appearance

- 11. The Commission finds that all carriers contributing to, and all carriers receiving distributions from the KUSF, and CURB, should be parties to this docket.
- 12. The Commission anticipates the number of carriers or entities that will want to be actively involved in this proceeding will be fewer than all carriers or entities being served with this Order. Active parties are those carriers or entities desiring to be involved in litigating issues that will be identified and explored in this general investigation. Only those entities that participate as active parties in this docket will be served with pleadings, testimony, briefs, and procedural orders as this proceeding progresses; only active parties will be given notice of and allowed to participate in hearings, roundtables, or other sessions that are scheduled in this proceeding. An entity that desires to participate as an active party in this proceeding shall file an Entry of Appearance within fifteen (15) days of the issuance of this Order. Any carrier or entity that is served with this Order, and chooses not to participate as an active party, will not be served with pleadings, testimony, briefs, and procedural orders during litigation of this docket. If a carrier or entity does not file an Entry of Appearance in this proceeding, but later desires to become an active party, that carrier or entity may do so by submitting a Late Filed Entry of

Appearance and state whether it is willing to receive electronic service and, if so, provide an email address for service, as discussed above and below. All entities being served with this Order will be served with any Commission decision that is a final order. Upon receipt of a Commission final order, an entity that chose not to actively participate in this docket will be allowed to petition for reconsideration, but the entity will not be allowed to introduce new issues inasmuch as it was given notice of the adjudicative proceeding with service of this Order, but chose not to participate.

13. The Commission urges active parties to this proceeding to consent to receipt of pleadings, testimony, briefs, and orders by electronic service without a hard-copy follow-up as required by K.A.R. 82-1-216(a)(6). A party may note its consent on its Entry of Appearance. Testimony, briefs, and other pleadings must be served electronically by 3:00 p.m. on the date due, without requiring service among the parties of a follow-up hard copy. However, the original and at least seven paper copies of testimony, briefs, and other pleadings must still be filed in the Commission's docket room by close of business on the date of the deadline. K.A.R. 82-1-215(a).⁴ Any electronic service of Commission or Prehearing Officer's orders without follow-up hard copies will specifically state in the electronic message serving the order that the electronic message constitutes service of the attached order and that a hard copy will not follow. Parties are directed to maintain accurate, current lists of electronic service email addresses based on information contained within the Commission's orders.

V. Protective Order

14. K.S.A. 66-1220a and K.A.R. 82-1-221a set forth requirements for the designation and treatment of information deemed confidential in Commission proceedings. The Commission

finds it is appropriate to issue this Protective Order in order to establish procedures relating to confidential data and information.

- 15. K.S.A. 66-1220a limits disclosure of trade secrets or confidential commercial information of regulated utilities. Under K.S.A. 66-1220a(a)(4), the Commission must consider alternatives to disclosure that will serve the public interest and protect the regulated entity. This Protective Order provides an interim procedure under K.S.A. 66-1220a(a)(4) to facilitate the prompt and orderly conduct of this case. This Protective Order will govern the treatment and handling of confidential information until further order of the Commission.
- 16. A party may designate as confidential any information that it believes, in good faith, to be a trade secret or other confidential commercial information. The party designating the information as confidential must provide a written statement of the specific grounds for the designation at the time the designation is made.⁵ The party claiming confidentiality has the burden of proving the confidential status of the information. Designating information as confidential does not establish that the information will remain confidential after review by the Commission.⁶
- 17. The provisions of this Protective Order apply only to CURB. The provisions also apply to Staff, except that Staff is not required to sign nondisclosure certificates or view voluminous materials on site and is not required to return or destroy confidential information upon request at the conclusion of a proceeding. Outside experts and consultants used by Staff shall have access to information and voluminous materials on the same basis as Staff, except that outside Staff experts and consultants are required to read this Protective Order and to sign

nondisclosure certificates as contained in Appendix A. Parties who do not sign a non-disclosure certificate will not be granted access to confidential information filed in this docket.

18. The following definitions shall apply:

<u>Information</u>: "Information" refers to all documents, data, including electronic data, studies and other materials furnished pursuant to requests for information or other modes or discovery, or any other information or documents that are otherwise a part of the Commission record.

Confidential Information: "Confidential information" refers to information which, if disclosed, would likely result in harm to a party's economic or competitive interests or which would result in harm to the public interest, generally, and which is not otherwise available from public sources. "Confidential information" may include, but is not limited to: (1) material or documents that contain information relating directly to specific customers; (2) employee-sensitive information; (3) marketing analyses or other market-specific information relating to services offered in competition with others; (4) reports, work papers or other documentation related to work produced by internal or external auditors or consultants; (5) strategies employed, to be employed, or under consideration; (6) contract negotiations; and, (7) information concerning trade secrets, as well as private technical, financial, and business information.

19. A party designating information as confidential shall make the confidential information available to parties seeking access or discovery under the restrictions in this Protective Order, if such disclosure is not otherwise privileged or objectionable on other evidentiary grounds. Disclosure of confidential information shall be made to attorneys of record and to authorized representatives, including outside experts, who are consulting with parties or intend to file testimony in this proceeding. Attorneys or authorized representatives seeking access to confidential information shall first read this Protective Order and sign a nondisclosure certificate as provided in Appendix A. In cases in which a utility's rates are being reviewed, attorneys and representatives of the utility whose rates are being reviewed are not required to sign nondisclosure certificates in order to receive copies of documents containing the utility's own confidential information. The nondisclosure certificate shall contain the signatory's name,

permanent address, title or position, date signed, and an affirmation that the signer is acting on behalf of a party to this proceeding. The nondisclosure certificate shall be filed in the docket. The party claiming confidentiality shall provide legible copies of the confidential information to requesting parties by serving one copy upon counsel for the requesting party. The requesting party may copy the confidential information and make it available to its authorized representatives who have signed and filed nondisclosure certificates. If a response to a discovery request requires the duplication of voluminous material, or the material is not easily copied because of its binding or size, the furnishing party may require that the voluminous material be viewed on its own premises. If duplication of voluminous material can be accomplished without undue burden on the party disclosing the information, the voluminous material may be copied at the expense of the requesting party. Voluminous material shall include documents or materials comprised of 500 pages or more.

- 20. A party may designate prefiled testimony and exhibits as confidential pursuant to this Protective Order. The specific grounds for the confidential designation shall be stated in writing at the time the designation is made or the testimony filed. Any party obtaining confidential information may use or refer to such information in prefiled or oral testimony provided that the confidentiality is maintained, unless otherwise ordered by the Commission.
- 21. If information to be disclosed in response to a data request contains confidential information designated by another party in this docket, the furnishing party shall maintain the confidential status by marking the information as confidential and only provide response to parties that have signed nondisclosure certificates. If information that a party intends to use in this proceeding or that would be disclosed in response to a data request contains confidential information obtained from a source outside of this proceeding, the party intending to use or

provide the confidential information must notify the original source which claimed confidential status to allow that entity to decide whether to claim confidentiality in this proceeding.

- 22. When pleadings, prefiled testimony, or exhibits include confidential information, the parties are to follow these procedures⁷:
 - a. File seven copies of the complete document, including all confidential information. The cover is to clearly state "CONFIDENTIAL VERSION." Confidential pages shall be stamped "CONFIDENTIAL," and the specific confidential information shall be identified by being underlined.
 - b. File one copy with the confidential portions redacted, for use as a public document. The cover is to clearly state "PUBLIC VERSION."
 - c. File one copy of the pages that contain confidential information in a separate envelope marked "CONFIDENTIAL." This filing will be maintained in the docket room file under seal. If there are multiple pages with confidential information and it is impracticable to separate the pages with the confidential information, the party may file instead one copy of the entire document that is stamped "CONFIDENTIAL."
- 23. Confidential testimony may be offered or subject to cross-examination at hearings. Parties have the right to object to the admissibility of confidential information on standard evidentiary grounds such as relevance. Confidential information that is received into evidence will be kept under seal. Confidential information shall be discussed only after the hearing is closed to all persons except the Commission, its Staff, hearing examiners, court reporters, attorneys of record and individuals to whom the designated information is available under the terms of this Protective Order. Parties shall make every effort at hearings to ask and answer questions in such a way as to preserve the confidentiality of the information without the need to close the hearing. The transcript of live testimony or oral argument disclosing confidential information shall be kept under seal and copies provided only to persons entitled to access to confidential information. Neither the parties nor their attorneys shall disclose or

provide copies of the contents of such transcripts to anyone other than those who may have access to the designated information under the terms of this Protective Order.

- 24. If a party disagrees with a claim that information is confidential or should not be disclosed, the parties shall first attempt to resolve the dispute on an informal basis. If the parties cannot resolve the dispute informally, the party contesting the confidential treatment may file a motion with the Commission. Commission Staff is also prepared to challenge a confidential designation when Staff believes that the information does not meet the definition of confidential information. When a dispute concerning the confidentiality is brought before the Commission, the Commission will review the matter to determine (1) if the party claiming confidentiality has met its burden of establishing the confidential designation is proper, and (2) whether disclosure is warranted under K.S.A. 66-1220a. The contested information shall not be disclosed pending the Commission's ruling.
- 25. All persons who are afforded access to confidential information under the terms of this Protective Order shall neither use nor disclose such information for purposes of business or competition or any other purpose other than the purpose of preparation for and litigation of this proceeding. During the course of this proceeding, parties shall keep confidential information secure in accordance with the purposes and intent of this order. At the conclusion of this proceeding, including judicial review, a party claiming that information was confidential may require that other persons in possession of its confidential information return or destroy all such confidential information and all notes, tapes, documents, and any other medium containing, summarizing, or otherwise embodying such confidential information. If the party claiming confidentiality requests destruction, the person destroying the information shall certify its

destruction. Counsel shall be entitled to retain memoranda or pleadings including or embodying confidential information to the extent reasonably necessary to preserve a file on this proceeding.

IT IS, THEREFORE, BY THE COMMISSION ORDERED THAT:

- A. Carriers shall file, in this Docket, their required Attachments and supporting documentation by October 17, 2014. Companies shall submit electronic versions of the filed Attachments, in Microsoft Excel format, and a copy of the supporting documentation to Staff at s.reams@kcc.ks.gov. A carrier not submitting data in a timely manner may be subject to penalty, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-138.
- B. With respect to service of process, the Commission waives the requirement that the Attachments and supporting documentation filed in this Docket be served upon all the parties. Parties need only file the Attachments and supporting documentation and serve them upon the Commission.
- C. Staff's proposed procedural schedule is adopted. Parties are directed to inform Staff as soon as possible if they become aware of any computation error, thus allowing Staff to timely file revised calculations, if necessary.
- D. The parties have fifteen (15) days, plus three (3) days if service of this order is by mail, from the date this order was served in which to petition the Commission for reconsideration of any issue or issues decided herein. K.S.A. 66-118b; K.S.A. 77-529(a)(1).
- E. The Commission retains jurisdiction over the subject matter and parties for the purpose of issuing such further order, or orders, as it may deem necessary.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Staff recommends that the Commission open a Docket to address the Kansas Universal Service Fund (KUSF) assessment rate and the statewide affordable residential and single-line business rates for the rate-of-return local exchange carriers (LECs) for the nineteenth year of the KUSF (Year 19), effective March 1, 2015, through February 29, 2016.

Attached to this Report are the Attachments to be completed by the United Telephone Companies of Kansas d/b/a CenturyLink, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT), and the rural LECs (RLECs). Each of these companies will complete Attachment A to allow Staff to determine the KUSF per line assessment rate each company will report to the KUSF. The per line assessment rate is the maximum rate that may also be collected from customers. The RLECs and CenturyLink need to submit Attachment B, and CenturyLink will need to submit Attachment C. Staff recommends that the companies file the Attachments and supporting documentation in the Docket no later than October 17, 2014. Staff also recommends that the Commission direct the companies to informally provide Staff with an electronic copy of their filed data, in Excel format, when they file their data in the Docket.

Staff is suggesting a procedural schedule that will allow the Commission to issue an Order to implement the KUSF Year 19 assessment rate and the affordable rates, effective March 1, 2015. Staff suggests that the Commission remind companies that they may be subject to penalties if the data is not provided in a timely manner.

BACKGROUND:

Each year, the Commission opens a Docket in which to address the KUSF assessment rate for the new KUSF fiscal year. KUSF Year 19 will be effective March 1, 2015, through February 29, 2016.

Prior Commission Orders opening the annual KUSF Docket have required companies receiving KUSF support to submit the current year's September 30th access line data, the resulting KUSF support calculations, and supporting documentation in the Docket in early November. KUSF support available to competitive Eligible Telecommunications Carriers (ETCs) is being phased-down to zero; therefore, these carriers do not need to submit their access line data or preliminary KUSF support calculations. The forms attached to Staff's Report regarding opening a new docket are typically attached to the Commission Order.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2005(e), the Commission must determine the affordable residential and single-line business rates for rate-of-return regulated LECs, effective March 2007 and every two years thereafter. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(1) requires the affordable residential rate to be the weighted arithmetic mean of the residential local service rates, as of October 1, for the rural LECs and rate groups 1 through 3 for CenturyLink, rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar. Rate groups are defined within each company's tariff. CenturyLink's rate groups 1 through 3 represent, in general, exchanges with 2,500 lines or less, making them comparable to the rural LEC rate groups and exchanges.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(1)(C) authorizes a rural LEC to increase its local rates a maximum of \$2.00 per year towards the affordable rates. K.S.A. 66-2005(d) requires that the related, calculated increased local service revenues must be used to reduce a rural LEC's KUSF support, even if the rural LEC elects to maintain local rates below the affordable rates. The calculation of the KUSF Year 19 assessment rate will include the support to be paid to each rural LEC, with such support adjusted to reflect the intrastate originating access revenue adjustments approved in Docket No. 15-GIMT-068-GIT (Docket 15-068).

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(2) states that the affordable single-line business rate is the existing rate or an amount \$3.00 higher than the affordable residential rate, whichever is greater.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(5) provides that when a rural LEC increases a local service rate after February 20, 2002, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007(b), the affordable rate for that rural LEC is increased by an amount equal to the rate increase. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(7) allows a rural LEC to adopt a uniform rate for residential and single line business local service and the rate must be deemed as an affordable rate for purposes of this subsection if the uniform rate generates an equal amount of revenue as that which would be generated by the separate residential and single-line affordable business rates. Currently, Home Telephone Company, Inc. (Home), Pioneer Communications (Pioneer), Totah Telephone Company,

Inc. (Totah), and United Telephone Association, Inc. (UTA) have uniform residential and business customer rates.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(8) states that this subsections' provisions do not apply to a rural LEC that does not receive KUSF support. Five rural LECs do not receive KUSF support: Bluestem Telephone Company (Bluestem), FairPoint Communications – Missouri (FairPoint), Haviland Telephone Company, Inc. (Haviland), MoKan Dial, Inc. (MoKan), and Sunflower Telephone Company (Sunflower).

The Commission determined the current affordable rates of \$16.75 for residential and \$19.75 for single-line business service in a January 16, 2013, Order in Docket No. 13-GIMT-130-GIT.² CenturyLink's residential rate for rate groups 1 through 3 is \$17.73.

Four rural LECs currently have residential rates lower than the \$16.75 residential affordable rate: Bluestem, FairPoint, MoKan, and Sunflower. FairPoint, MoKan, and Sunflower also have business rates that are lower than the affordable business rate.

ANALYSIS:

Staff will need to review the data filed by each of the companies, calculate the RLEC affordable residential and business service rates, and incorporate the revenue impacts in its KUSF support calculation for each qualifying company and the calculation of the KUSF assessment rate. Staff will also incorporate any intrastate originating revenue adjustments resulting from Docket 15-068 in its calculations and submit testimony supporting its calculations to the Commission in mid-December.

Staff recommends that companies submit their data no later than October 17, 2014. This time frame should be sufficient for the rural LECs and CenturyLink to report their September 30, 2014, access lines and October 1, 2014, local rates by rate group. The local rates in effect today should not change prior to October 1, 2014, since regulated companies must provide the Commission and customers at least 30-days' notice prior to increasing rates, and if a rural LEC elects to increase rates pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007(b), the rate increase cannot go into effect for at least 60 days. Finally, CenturyLink's annual price cap update became effective June 1, 2014.

A. Preliminary Affordable Rates

The Commission determines the affordable residential and single-line business rates for the rural LECs at the same time that it addresses the next year's KUSF assessment rate.⁴ Due to the timing of the receipt of information and Staff filing testimony in mid-December, Staff calculated the preliminary March 1, 2015, affordable rates based on the rural LECs' and CenturyLink's residential rates as of July 31, 2014, and the access lines each company reported in its Annual Report for the year-ended December 31, 2013.

Table 1 shows the average residential rate and the percentage of residential lines for the rural LECs and CenturyLink and the resulting weighted-average rate:

The weighted average rate of \$17.04 is to be rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar, or \$17.00. This indicates that the affordable residential rate will increase from \$16.75 to \$17.00, effective March 1, 2015. The affordable single-line business rate must be \$3.00 higher than the residential rate; therefore, Staff's preliminary calculations indicate the affordable single-line business rate of \$19.75 will increase to \$20.00.

All rural LECs should complete Attachment B by reporting their rates and number of lines by rate group. A rural LEC that receives KUSF support and that has residential and/or single-line business rates below the preliminary \$17.00 and \$20.00 rates should reflect a monthly rate increase up to the \$2.00 maximum, based on these preliminary rates. The Commission has not historically required a rural LEC that does not receive KUSF support to file Attachment B; however, Staff recommends that these companies complete Attachment B without reflecting any local rate increases.

Home, Totah, Pioneer, and UTA have unified residential and business rates; therefore, each of these companies should adjust its unified rate to allow it to recover revenue equal to what it would recover if the company applied the affordable rates. And, any rural LEC that implemented a rate increase after February 2002, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007(b), will need to increase its rates above the affordable rates by an amount equal to the rate increase implemented.

B. Proposed Procedural Schedule

Staff needs sufficient time to review and analyze all filed data, review revenue and other data provided by the KUSF Administrator, GVNW Consulting, Inc.; perform all necessary calculations; and submit testimony to the Commission. The Commission generally issues an Order adopting the new KUSF assessment rate and affordable rates in mid-to-late January to allow companies time to revise their billing systems. Staff, therefore, suggests the following procedural schedule:

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Commission open a new Docket to address the affordable rates for rate-of-return LECs and the KUSF Year 19 assessment rate. Staff recommends that the Attachments included with this Report be enclosed with the Commission's Order. CenturyLink, SWBT, and the RLECs should all file Attachment A. The RLECs and CenturyLink will need to complete and file Attachment B. Staff recommends that the RLECs utilize the \$17.00 and \$20.00 preliminary affordable residential and single-line business rates, respectively, to complete Attachment B and that CenturyLink report its line count and rate information for rate groups 1 through 3 on Attachment B. CenturyLink will also need to complete Attachment C. Staff recommends that CenturyLink, the RLECs, and SWBT be directed to file their information in the Docket and provide an electronic copy of the filings, in Excel format, to Staff.

Staff recommends that the Commission adopt the proposed procedural schedule and that the Commission remind parties that if a party becomes aware of any computational error within the calculations supported by Staff, that the party notify Staff as soon as possible to allow Staff to determine whether the error is material, and if so, file revised calculations.
