ORDER OPENING DOCKET AND ESTABLISHING PROCEDURAL SCHEDULE

NOW, the above-captioned matter comes before the State Corporation Commission of the State of Kansas ("Commission") for consideration and decision. Having reviewed its files and records and being duly advised in the premises, the Commission makes the following findings:

1. K.S.A. 66-2008(a) states: "The commission shall require every telecommunications carrier, telecommunications public utility and wireless telecommunications service provider that provides intrastate telecommunications services and, to the extent not prohibited by federal law, every provider of interconnected VoIP service, as defined by 47 C.F.R. 9.3 (October 1, 2005), to contribute to the [Kansas Universal Service Fund ("KUSF")] on an equitable and nondiscriminatory basis." On December 27, 1996, in Docket No. 94-GIMT-478-GIT, the Commission declared that the contribution would be a yearly assessment on each provider's intrastate retail revenues.

2. Pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2005(e), on March 1, 2007, and every two years thereafter, the Commission must determine a new affordable residential and single-line business rate for

rate of return rural local exchange carriers ("RLECs"). The affordable rate is the "mean of residential local service rates charged in this state in all exchanges served by rural telephone companies and in all exchanges in rate groups 1 through 3 as of February 20, 2002, of all other local exchange carriers, weighted by the number of residential access lines to which each such rate applies, and thereafter rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar..." for residential service. If a Company's residential rate as of March 1, 2007 was higher than the calculated affordable rate, the Company's rate was deemed affordable. The affordable rate for single-line business service is the residential rate plus \$3.00 or the existing rate (whichever is higher). Rate groups 1 through 3 are not defined in the Kansas Statutes, but are exchanges comparable to the exchanges served by RLECs. Once the affordable rates are determined, rate-of-return RLECs having rates below such affordable rates that choose not to raise them according to K.S.A. 66-2005's procedures will receive a reduction in KUSF support. The affordable rate is a metric related to KUSF support, therefore K.S.A. 66-2005(e)'s provisions do not apply to an RLEC that does not receive KUSF support. However, such an RLEC's residential rates are included in the affordable rate calculation. See K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(8).

3. In order to calculate both the KUSF assessment rate for KUSF Year 17 (March 1, 2013 through February 28, 2014) and the affordable rate, the Commission requires the incumbent LECs and any competitive ETC receiving KUSF support, or that may request KUSF support, to submit certain data.

4. Commission Staff ("Staff") submitted a Report and Recommendation on August 2, 2012, attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference. Staff recommended that carriers submit their data utilizing forms created by Staff labeled Attachments A through E. Staff recommended that Companies submit information to support their reported line counts and preliminary KUSF calculations. Staff also recommended a procedural schedule that would ensure sufficient time to review and analyze all filed data, perform all necessary calculations, and submit testimony to the Commission in order for the Commission to adopt the KUSF Year 17 assessment rate in a timely manner.

5. Staff recommended companies use the Attachments to this Order to file their data:

7. In order for the Commission to address the next year's KUSF assessment rate and affordable rates at the same time, Staff calculated the Preliminary Affordable Rates to be utilized by the RLECs and CenturyLink when completing Attachment B. The residential and single-line Preliminary Affordable Rates are \$16.75 and \$19.75, respectively.

8. Staff also suggested that if a party becomes aware of any computational error within Staff's filed calculations, that the party informs Staff as soon as possible. This will allow Staff to determine whether the error is material and file revised calculations, if necessary.

9. The Commission finds Staff's recommendations to be reasonable and hereby adopts the same.

IT IS, THEREFORE, BY THE COMMISSION ORDERED THAT:

A. Carriers shall file, in this Docket, their required Attachments and supporting documentation by October 17, 2012. A carrier not submitting the data in a timely manner may be subject to penalty, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-138.

B. Staff's proposed procedural schedule is adopted. Parties are directed to inform Staff as soon as possible if they become aware of any computation error to allow Staff to timely file revised calculations, if necessary.

C. The parties have fifteen (15) days, plus three (3) days if service of this order is by mail, from the date this order was served in which to petition the Commission for reconsideration of any issue or issues decided herein. K.S.A. 66-118b; K.S.A. 77-529(a)(1).

D. The Commission retains jurisdiction over the subject matter and parties for the purpose of issuing such further order, or orders, as it may deem necessary.

SUBJECT: In the Matter of An Investigation to Determine the Assessment Rate and the Affordable Local Service Rates for Rate-of-Return Regulated Carrier for the Seventeenth Year of the Kansas Universal Service Fund, Effective March 1, 2013.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Staff recommends that the Commission open a Docket to address the Kansas Universal Service Fund (KUSF) assessment rate and the statewide affordable residential and single-line business rates for the rate-of-return local exchange carriers (LECs) for the seventeenth year of the KUSF (Year 17), effective March 1, 2013, through February 28, 2014.

Every company currently receiving KUSF support and any competitive Eligible Telecommunications Carrier (ETC) that intends to request KUSF support during KUSF Year 17 needs to file its September 30, 2012, access line data and the resulting preliminary KUSF support calculations with the Commission. The rural LECs and the United Telephone Companies of Kansas d/b/a CenturyLink (CenturyLink) also need to file their October 1, 2012, residential and single-line business rates, by rate group, to allow Staff to calculate the rural LEC affordable residential and single-line business rates.

Staff recommends that the companies use the Attachments to this Report to file their data. Staff recommends that each company submit documentation to support their filings. Staff is also suggesting a procedural schedule that will allow the Commission to issue an Order addressing the KUSF assessment rate and the affordable rates, effective March 1, 2013. To achieve this, Staff recommends that companies file their KUSF Year 17 data on or before October 17, 2012. Staff suggests that the Commission remind companies that they may be subject to penalties if the data is not provided in a timely manner.



BACKGROUND:

Each year, the Commission opens a Docket in which to address the KUSF assessment rate for the new KUSF fiscal year. KUSF Year 17 is effective March 1, 2013, through February 28, 2014.

Prior Commission Orders opening the annual KUSF Docket have required companies receiving KUSF support to submit their current year's September 30th access line data, the resulting KUSF support calculations, and supporting documentation in the docket in early November.¹ Other competitive ETCs that intend to seek initial and/or supplemental KUSF support for the new KUSF year are also to file this data. The forms attached to Staff's Report regarding opening a new docket are typically attached to the Commission Order. To ensure data is filed in a timely manner, companies are advised that they may be subject to penalties if the data is not provided in a timely manner.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2005(e), the Commission must determine the affordable residential and single-line business rates for rate-of-return regulated LECs, effective March 2007 and every two years thereafter. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(1) requires the affordable residential rate to be the weighted arithmetic mean of the residential local service rates, as of October 1, for the rural LECs and rate groups 1 through 3 for CenturyLink, rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar. Rate groups are defined within each company's tariff. CenturyLink's rate groups 1 through 3 represent, in general, exchanges with 2,500 lines or less, making them comparable to the rural LEC rate groups and exchanges.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(1)(C) authorizes a rural LEC to increase its local rates a maximum of \$2.00 per year towards the affordable rates. K.S.A. 66-2005(d) requires that the related, calculated increased local service revenues must be used to reduce a rural LEC's KUSF support, even if the rural LEC elects to maintain local rates below the affordable rates. And, consistent with K.S.A. 66-2005(c), the intrastate access revenue adjustments approved in Docket No. 13-GIMT-004-GIT² will be incorporated into the calculation of a rural LEC's KUSF support.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(2) states that the affordable single-line business rate is the existing rate or an amount \$3.00 higher than the affordable residential rate, whichever is greater.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(5) provides that when a rural LEC increases a local service rate after February 20, 2002, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007(b), the affordable rate for that rural LEC is increased by an amount equal to the rate increase. K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(7) allows a rural LEC to adopt a uniform rate for residential and single line business local service and the rate must be deemed as an affordable rate for purposes of this subsection if the uniform rate generates an equal amount of revenue as that which would be generated by the separate residential and single-line affordable business rates. Currently, Home Telephone Company, Inc. (Home), Pioneer

Communications (Pioneer), Totah Telephone Company, Inc. (Totah), and United Telephone Association, Inc. (UTA) have uniform residential and business customer rates.

K.S.A. 66-2005(e)(8) states that this subsections' provisions do not apply to a rural LEC that does not receive KUSF support. Five rural LECs do not receive KUSF support: Bluestem Telephone Company (Bluestem), FairPoint Communications – Missouri (FairPoint), Haviland Telephone Company, Inc. (Haviland), MoKan Dial, Inc. (MoKan), and Sunflower Telephone Company (Sunflower).

The Commission determined the current affordable rates of \$16.25 for residential and \$19.25 for single-line business service on January 12, 2011, in Docket No. 11-GIMT-201-GIT.³ CenturyLink's residential rate for rate groups 1 through 3 is \$17.73.

Four rural LECs currently have residential rates lower than the \$16.25 residential affordable rate: Bluestem, FairPoint, MoKan, and Sunflower. Bluestem, FairPoint and MoKan also have business rates that are lower than the affordable business rate.

ANALYSIS:

Staff will need to review multiple companies' access line and local service rate data, review and calculate the KUSF support for each qualifying company, calculate the affordable residential and business service rates and KUSF assessment rate, and submit testimony supporting its calculations to the Commission in mid-December.

Staff is recommending that companies submit their data no later than October 17, 2012. This time frame should be sufficient for the rural LECs and CenturyLink to report their September 30, 2012, access lines and October 1, 2012, local rates by rate group. The local rates in effect today should not change prior to October 1, 2012, for several reasons. First, regulated companies must provide the Commission and customers at least 30-days notice prior to increasing rates. K.S.A. 66-117. Next, if a rural LEC elects to increase rates pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007(b), the rate increase cannot go into effect for at least 60 days. In addition, CenturyLink's annual price cap update became effective June 1, 2012.⁴

Since K.S.A. 66-2005 was amended, the Commission has determined the affordable rates for the rural LECs at the same time that it addresses the next year's KUSF assessment rate.⁶ To allow the Commission to do this, Staff calculated the preliminary March 1, 2013, affordable rates based on the rural LECs' and CenturyLink's residential rates as of July 30, 2012, and the access lines each company reported in its Annual Report for the year-ended December 31, 2011.

Table 1 shows the average residential rate and the percentage of residential lines for the rural LECs and CenturyLink and the resulting weighted-average rate:

The weighted average rate of \$16.73 must be rounded to the nearest quarter-dollar - \$16.75. This indicates that the affordable residential rate will increase from \$16.25 to \$16.75. The affordable single-line business rate must be \$3.00 higher than the residential rate; therefore, Staff's preliminary calculations indicate the affordable single-line business rate of \$19.25 will increase to \$19.75.

All rural LECs should complete Attachment B regarding their rates and number of lines, by rate group. A rural LEC that receives KUSF support and that has residential and/or single-line business rates below the preliminary \$16.75 and \$19.75 rates should reflect a monthly rate increase up to the \$2.00 maximum, based on these preliminary rates. The Commission has not historically required a rural LEC that does not receive KUSF support to file Attachment B; however, Staff recommends that these companies complete Attachment B without reflecting any local rate increases. The Commission will address the rural LECs adjusting their intrastate access rates to interstate levels in Docket No. 13-GIMT-004-GIT (Docket 13-004)⁷ and requested comments from parties with regards to certain Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) Intercarrier Compensation reforms and their impact on the rural LECs' intrastate access rates. Therefore, the information requested in Attachment B may be beneficial, depending on the policy determinations in Docket 13-004.

Home, Totah, Pioneer, and UTA have unified residential and business rates; therefore, they should adjust their unified rates by an amount that will allow them to recover an amount of revenue equal to what would be recovered if the company applied the affordable rates. And, any rural LEC that implemented a rate increase after February 2002, pursuant to K.S.A. 66-2007, will need to increase its rates above the affordable rates by an amount equal to the rate increase implemented.

B. Proposed Procedural Schedule

To ensure Staff has sufficient time to review and analyze all filed data, perform all necessary calculations, and submit testimony to the Commission in order for the Commission to adopt the KUSF Year 17 assessment rate in a timely manner, Staff suggests the following procedural schedule:

To allow companies time to revise their billing systems, the Commission generally issues an Order adopting the new KUSF assessment rate and affordable rates in mid-to-late January.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Commission open a new Docket to address the affordable rates for rate-ofreturn LECs and the KUSF Year 17 assessment rate. Staff recommends that the Attachments included with this Report be enclosed with the Commission's Order and that the rural LECs utilize the \$16.75 and \$19.75 preliminary affordable residential and single-line business rates, respectively, to complete Attachment B. CenturyLink should also provide line count and rate information for rate groups 1 through 3 on Attachment B.

Staff recommends that the Commission adopt the proposed procedural schedule and further recommends that the Commission remind parties that if a party becomes aware of any computational error within the calculations supported by Staff, that the party notify Staff as soon as possible to allow Staff to determine whether the error is material, and if so, file revised calculations.
